## **Transport**

We encourage you to travel in an environmentally friendly way. If possible, please travel by public transport. In case of reduced mobility, please contact us so that we may assist you accordingly!

#### Getting from the airport to the city by train:

- <u>City Airport Train</u>: 30 min. interval, 16 min. ride (non-stop), stops at Landstraße-Wien-Mitte
- <u>Schnellbahn S7</u> (suburban train): 30 min. interval, 25 min. ride (with stops), stops at Landstraße-Wien-Mitte

### Getting from the airport to the city by bus:

<u>Vienna Airport Lines</u>: 30 min. interval, 20-40 min. ride, stops near Schwedenplatz (line 1) as well as at Wien Hauptbahnhof and Wien Westbahnhof (line 2)

#### Public transport in Vienna:

The Vienna public transport network is extensive and reliable. Tickets are available for single rides and extended periods (e.g. 24-72 hours). Trips can easily be planned <u>online</u> or via the mobile app WienMobil (available for Android and iOS).

#### Accommodation

Participants are responsible for booking and paying for their accommodation. There are <u>numerous hotels in all categories</u> close to the meeting venue on Stubenring 1, 1010 Vienna. Please also find online a list of accommodations awarded with the <u>Austrian Ecolabel</u>.

The Ministry is situated on Vienna's iconic Ringstraße, which encases the city's historic centre. It is within walking distance (2-7 minutes) from several public transport stops: Schwedenplatz (metro lines U1, U4), Julius-Raab-Platz (tram lines 1, 2), Stubentor (metro line U3), and Landstraße-Wien-Mitte (metro lines U3, U4).
